RESEARCH INTERESTS

I have a widely interdisciplinary background, which fits in perfectly with my position in Interdisciplinary Studies. I am probably one of the few people in the world who attended both an all-women's college, Douglass College of Rutgers University, and an all men's (at that time), Princeton University. I received scholarships which financed my entire education and studied Japanese language and culture at Princeton Univ. as a National Defense Foreign Language Scholar.

In 1972 I completed the MA at Stanford Univ. in Japanese Studies, with a thesis on Japanese Business Practices under Prof. Harumi Befu. After a stint editing biochemistry journals, I re-entered Princeton Univ., wishing to apply knowledge to practical problems, finished an MA in Sociology and worked for several years doing research in the Division of Youth and Family Services, NJ, particularly on foster care and adoption of children. In the town of Princeton, I also was a president of and later CFO of a non-profit health education agency.

From there I was recruited into the Ph.D. program in Social Work at Rutgers Univ., specializing in administration and economics and completed my Ph.D. under Prof. David Mechanic on social functioning in schizophrenics. By that time I was Asst. Director of an innovative residence for schizophrenics and also did consulting on non-profit management. However, I married and moved to Dallas, Texas where I began a health education consulting firm with a nurse which supplied wellness and management programs to businesses, and also did extensive free-lance writing.

In 1985 I began teaching in the School of Social Sciences at UTD and later switched to Interdisciplinary Studies to teach and direct the internship program. I also hold licenses as a Licensed Professional Counselor, Certified Social Worker (Advanced Clinical Practice), and Hypnotherapist, although I do not currently maintain a practice. Academically, I am particularly interested in research on ways of coping with chronic illness.
